

Line up all of the new and existing Cubs and tell them they are going to go outside and have some fun. Send them with two leaders just outside the cafeteria and have them teach all of the boys the Cub Scout Sign, Promise and Motto (this takes about 7-10 minutes). During this time give the parents an overview of Cub Scouts (Tigers, Wolves, Bears, Webelos, Den meetings, Pack meetings, etc.) Remind them about Scouting's 93 year record of helping to build character and instill values in boys across America, but mention that the boys only came to have fun and that the character building happens through that fun. About this time the boys outside will be ready to come inside and share with the families what they have learned. Line them up in front of the room and help lead them in the Promise. Then have them say the motto, louder, and one more time even louder! This is a good time to talk about advancement and the Bobcat badge. There are 8 requirements for Bobcat and in 30 minutes all the new boys are halfway there!

Do a cheer for the Cubs to recognize that they "Did Their Best" and then send them out to the playground (with supervision) as a way to reward them for learning something new. Take a few minutes while the boys are outside to explain, line-by-line the Cub Scout Promise. Place special emphasis on Duty to God and country and on helping other people. Take a moment to answer any questions and then send for the boys, because it is time to have some fun! Enclosed are the specifics for each step.

RECRUITMENT CALENDAR

- June - August** Packs conduct their annual Pack Program Planning Conference establishing their activity calendar and their annual budget.
- Packs encourage new and existing leaders to attend Cub Basic Training.
- Unit Leader Volunteers & District Executives meet with School Administrators to work out details of fall School Night for Scouting.
- Units Earn the Summer Time Pack Award
- August - September** With District support, Packs conduct "School Night" recruitment of youth and adults.
- Units provide new parent orientation meetings (including Fast Start Training) for all new parents.
- All Leaders and Parents are encouraged to attend Basic Leader Training.
- September – October** Units sell Popcorn to fund "Ideal year of Scouting" for the year round program.
- Packs follow up with new Cubs not assigned to Dens
- Follow-up recruitment at School Open Houses, PTO meetings, etc.
- October - November** Districts provide Basic Training, Council activities (Fun W' Son, Family Camp, Webelos Woods)
- November - December** Unit Recharter months, Reach Centennial Quality Unit Award

Steps for Success with Cub Scout Recruitment

- A. Communication –
 - Unit Leaders & District Executives communicate with schools on SNFS procedure, secure dates (avoid conflicts), Boy Talk approval, Marquis usage, fliers, yard signs, etc. Pack leaders follow up to insure that all plans are set. See “GETTING THE WORD OUT FOR SCHOOL NIGHT”
- B. Fliers –
 - 1st flier should be out between 10-12 days before rally. Folder day?
 - How many? (Bilingual fliers will be made available if needed)
 - 2nd flier (reminder) goes out at 2-4 days before rally
- C. Boy Talks –
 - By school – no earlier than 24 hours prior to rally
 - At principals discretion (1st choice – classroom by classroom, 2nd choice – by assembly, 3rd choice – PE, last resort – Lunch or Recess)
 - Reminder Sticker
- D. School Night for Scouting Rally –
 - 1 hour – no longer –follow agenda
 - In each school (no first rallies in Scout Huts or churches)
 - Distribute New Family information and training opportunities
 - Rally Kits needed for each rally (applications, minimags, Den rosters, etc.)
 - Fun W Son and Family Camp information
 - FUN! – See agenda
- E. New Parent Orientation
 - 7 – 10 days after rally
 - Cub Scout Orientation Video
 - Fast Start Training (also available on our web site – www.cvcbsa.org)
 - New Den Leader Kits
 - See agenda
- F. Follow Up –
 - Open Houses (1 or 2 volunteers man a table to give out info)
 - PTA meetings (Pack does flag presentation for 1st mtg.)
 - Church Rallies with all chartered partners
- G. Training
 - Encourage all new adults to attend training – use New Den Leader Folders
 - Sessions will be held in each district (some Saturdays, some Tues-Thurs – check you district’s training schedule)
- H. Program: Encourage Fun with Son & Family Camp & Popcorn Sale
 - Studies have shown we must have an activity within one month of recruiting so Newly Recruited Scouts have something exciting to look forward to.
 - Popcorn Sales can fund their entire year.
 - Share pack activity calendar with all new families

“GETTING THE WORD OUT FOR SCHOOL NIGHT”

- Boy Talks – Leaders talk to the boys at school about joining Cub Scouts. Use second fliers and stickers as reminders.
- Be sure 2 sets of fliers were sent out on time.
- Posters in school, businesses, religious institutions, etc.
- Boys wear uniforms day of rally.
- Shoe polish messages on Pack family cars when they drop off and pick up their kids at school.
- Chalk messages on sidewalk.
- Parents who are leaders have lunch with their son on day of rally wearing their leader uniform.
- Put messages on the marquee at schools and businesses, subdivisions.
- Boys in den meeting make yard signs and then place them out in their own yard.
- Fliers in or messages on grocery bags.
- Banners or portable signs on well-traveled roads.
- Pack sets up Pinewood Derby, Pushmobile, or some kind of activity after school during the week prior to School Night.
- Cubs conduct the school or PTA flag ceremony prior to School Night.
- Public Address (PA) announcement in school on day of rally.
- Articles in local newspapers, subdivision newsletters, as well as school and religious institution newsletters.

BOY TALKS: TO PROMOTE ATTENDANCE AT SCHOOL NIGHT

Held during school hours the day of the rally.

PURPOSE: To excite and encourage boys to attend the School Night event.

PREPARATION: Ask principal for a few minutes to meet with all boys 1st through 5th grades

This can be done several ways:

- Classroom to classroom. (the preferred method)
- Assembly style by grade (or all grades together)
- In PE classes (or specials)
- At lunch or recess (worst case scenario)

WHO: Uniformed, enthusiastic Scouter(s), preferably a volunteer that is very familiar with the school (and vice versa) and the specific program(s) of the pack(s).

BOY TALK AGENDA

I. SHARE EXCITEMENT – KEEP IT SIMPLE, MAKE IT FUN!

- A. If possible, have a Cub Scout tell the class what they enjoy about Cub Scouting.
- B. Share examples of den and pack activities (use props, backpack, PWD car, etc.)
 1. Cub Scout pinewood derby races
 2. Family Campouts – (mention campfires, marshmallows and ghost stories)
 3. Fun W Son, Family Camp, and other activities (mention BB-guns and Bows and Arrows)

II. INFORMATION ON SCHOOL NIGHT

- A. Date and time
- B. Place (School Cafeteria)
- C. Purpose – to give an overview of Scouting, answer questions, HAVE FUN!!!

III. WHAT THE BOY NEEDS TO BRING TO SCHOOL NIGHT

- A. Bring an adult
- B. Registration fees

IV. DISTRIBUTE INFORMATION – 2nd FLIERS/STICKERS

V. SUMMARY

Finish up presentation with an enthusiastic statement on the Cub Scout program

VI. QUESTIONS

If time is available, briefly answer questions. Explain that more information will be available at the School Night meeting. – BE PREPARED.

VII. THANKS TO TEACHER / PRINCIPAL

Ask the Principal to make a follow-up announcement on school P.A. system.

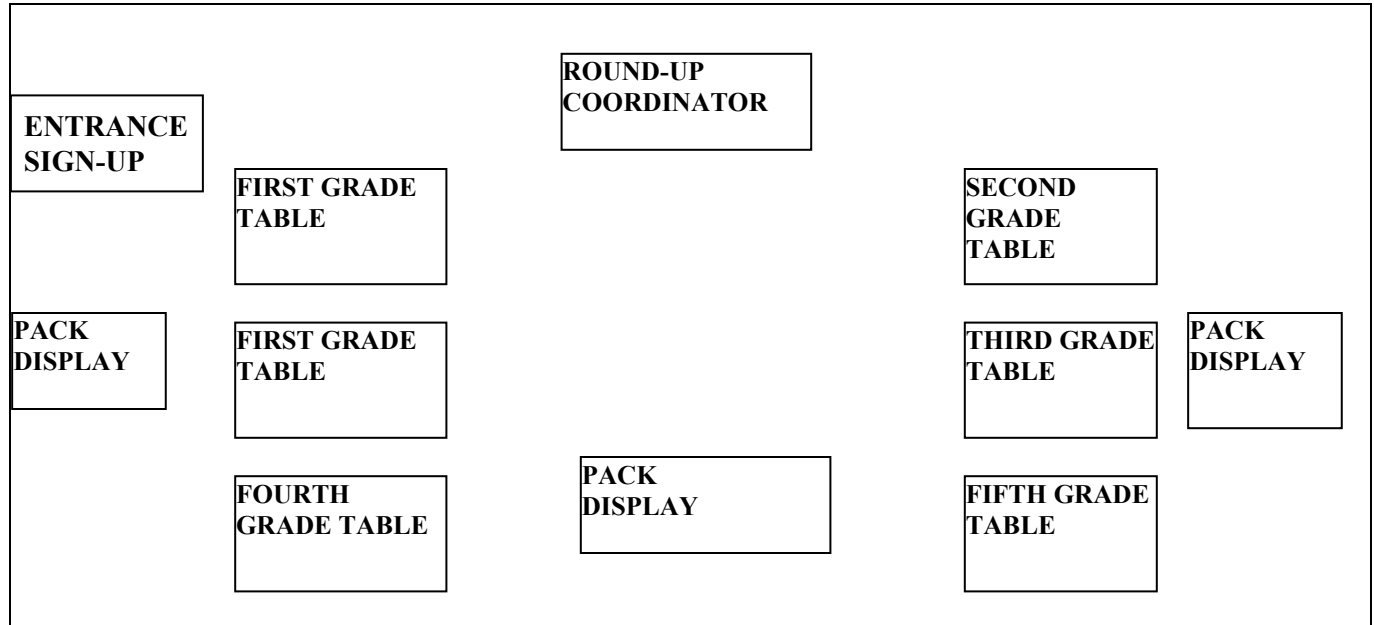
- ___ Organize your materials and set up room properly.

- ___ Keep boys and parents in assigned room.
- ___ Boys and parents should sit together by grade and/or neighborhood.

THE GENERAL PRESENTATION

- ___ Begin on time.
- ___ Opening ceremony by Pack or Troop (preferable).
- ___ Introduce yourself and welcome everyone on behalf of your council and the Boy Scouts of America.
- ___ Introduce other School Night team members and pack leadership.
- ___ Follow School Night agenda (pages 7 & 8) carefully.

Be sure to turn in all applications, monies, attendance rosters, and report envelopes at your District Report Meeting or to your District Executive.

HOW TO ORGANIZE SAMPLE SET-UP



Above is a sample layout of a typical School Night set-up. Be sure all tables are clearly marked by assigned grade and/or neighborhood. As parents and boys enter, ask them to sign attendance roster, give the adult application forms, give the new boy a mini-boy's life magazine, thank them all for coming and direct them to the appropriate table. Doing this simple task at the beginning will save a tremendous amount of time and organization later. Parents and youth are already sitting in "den areas" that will make the registration process go smoothly and the School Night registration can begin.

Create fun displays showcasing what your Pack has been doing the past year. Include Pinewood Derby Cars, pictures from camp, crafts, projects, etc. – remember to have Cub books, uniforms and flyers at each table. This type of set-up provides an eye-catching display and gives the family some things to look forward to. Promote uniforms. A mini campsite set-up in entry area serves as a great visual for the Cub Scout Outdoor Programs. **DON'T TRY TO DO TOO MUCH!!!**
KEEP THE EVENING SHORT, FUN AND SIMPLE!

(The two founding principles of the Boy Scout of America. We respect the religions of all people and emphasize the importance of believing. We teach about citizenship and the importance of honoring our country and its' Flag)

to help other people...

(Something Scouts are known for, from helping ladies across the street and Food Drives, to actually saving peoples lives, Scouts, who are in the program for several years learn to be prepared to handle emergency situations when they arise – great examples in *Boy's Life*)

and to obey the Law of the Pack.

(The Law of the Pack is the next step on the trail to Bobcat for these new Cubs. Remind the adults that there are eight requirements to attain the first rank in Cub Scouts and that their boys are already half way there!)

VI. Play The Newspaper Game! – 10-15 minutes

Rejoin the boys with the adults reminding them that they came there for FUN!

Explain the rules of the game (see page 10)

Play the game (Have Fun!) – identify good prospects for future leaders

VII. Discuss Details/Answer Questions– 10 minutes

Fees and re-chartering (Be brief, but explain where the money goes)

Leadership needs of the Pack (remind them that the boys get the best program, and everything is easier when everyone contributes)

Promote Fun W Son, Family Camp, Pinewood Derby, Roundtable, etc.

Fill out and collect applications and fees (get all applications back)

Promote the WWW.SCOUTPARENTS.ORG Website.

VIII. Next Meeting – 3 minutes

Give date, time and location of next meeting (this should be the new parent orientation done within 7 – 10 days of the rally and should be held at the regular location of the Pack meetings)

Thank everyone for taking the time to come and for showing an interest in Scouting

IX. Follow-Up

Answer questions

Take time to plant seeds with new prospects

Compile list of all prospective leaders (a quick discussion among existing leaders helps to see if anyone is familiar with any prospects)

Check applications against sign-in sheet to see if any were missed

Some Reminders –

Start and end on time (rally should be 1 hour – no more!)

Involve everyone

Keep things simple, lively and moving

The Newspaper Game

Materials needed - a generous supply of newspaper (available at the Council Office) and several rolls of masking tape.

Directions - Divide the group of new Cubs and their parents into Den-sized groups. It is OK to combine grade levels to get a group of 6-8 (not counting adults) but try to keep like grade boys together. Existing leaders will be needed to observe this activity and should not participate otherwise.

Step 1 Explain to the group that this game requires the participation of every person in the group, adult and boy. The first thing the group should do is to pick a model (a boy), or two. This needs to be one of the new boys. Then the group needs to decide on a costume that they can make from their stack of newspaper (throw out suggestions such as; pirate, Indian, astronaut, football player, etc.). Further explain that they will have **5 minutes** to complete the costume and then they will need to select one adult member of the group to be the spokesperson who will describe the costume to the independent panel of judges (the judges should be 3 or 4 current leaders, commissioners, or other district personnel). Let the group know that sometimes the explanation sways the judges as much as the costume and that the winners will be recognized. If there are no questions, yell GO!

Step 2 While the groups are making their costumes, existing leaders and judges need to mingle and pay close attention to the action. **See Special Note.**

Step 3 After about 4 minutes announce that there are 3 minutes left (Cub Scout time!). 2 minutes left after a couple of more minutes, etc. 1 or 2 minutes later let the groups know that they need to put on the finishing touches and prepare for the judges. Only the model(s) and the one adult spokesperson should be standing. Start with the 1st-graders and go group-by-group letting them explain their costumes to the judges. Applaud each group after their explanation. After all the groups have finished let the judges converse with each other for a few minutes, only to come to the decision that all of the costumes are so good that they cannot decide on a single one, so, EVERYONE WINS! (In Cub Scouts everyone is a winner). Get a big round of applause, or other cheer, for everyone and then let the boys disassemble the costumes (**models should have the option of wearing the costume home before anyone tears it off of them** - this will avoid anyone's feelings getting hurt) Then make sure the groups clean up their area.

Special Note - Your observers will be looking for behavior consistent with what we look for in a prospective leader. Such as - good delegation, smiling faces, gets others involved, creativity (all qualities of a good Den Leader), a really unique story behind the costume (Assistant Cubmaster material). Also be watching for people who distance themselves from the action or that assume a negative body posture (these are to be avoided). Find out the names of the prospects and plant a seed (You looked like you were really having a good time with the boys during the game...that's what Cub Scouts is all about). Depending on the situation, it works best to recruit one week later at the new parent orientation.

LEADERSHIP SELECTION

PACK PLANNING MEETING

Cubmasters and other pack leaders are constantly searching for ways to involve families so their boys will get the best Cub Scouting has to offer. The following agenda is for a pack adults' meeting. It can be tailored to fit your own pack needs. It may be best to hold the adults' meeting on a different night from the regular pack meeting.

The Cubmaster plans and conducts the adults' meeting with the help of the pack committee, den leader coach, and other leaders. The unit commissioner can be invited to participate. You should include the chartered organization representative as a part of this meeting.

SUGGESTED AGENDA FOR PACK PLANNING MEETING

Before the Meeting

1. Set up tables and chairs as needed.
2. Set up exhibits of den projects.
3. Have all materials and equipment on hand.

Pre-Opening Period

1. A welcoming committee greets the pack families as they arrive.
2. Register attendance and hand out name tags.
3. Conduct a pre-opening activity or game.

MAIN PART OF THE MEETING (30 Minutes)

Opening (5 minutes)

- A. Lead the Pledge of Allegiance or another opening ceremony.
- B. Welcome everyone and make introductions.
- C. Briefly review family responsibilities.

- Review the pack plans for the year. (The themes, special activities and projects decided on at the annual pack program planning conference.
- Discuss leadership needs.
 - Select den and pack leaders, as needed; if there are planned vacancies for the pack round-up in August, select at this time. (*Selecting Cub Scout Leadership, No. 13-500*, provides the important steps needed.
 - Recruit any leadership needed for special pack activities for the year.

- The chartered organization representative briefly discusses how the chartered organization will help the pack.
- Discuss other pack needs and ways that the families can help (budget, dues, uniforms, equipment, etc.)
- Hold a question-and-answer session.
- Provide New Den Leader Kit and promote Fast Start Training online for new leadership. Promote Basic Training sessions with new leadership. Promote the www.scoutparents.org Website.

Closing (3-5 minutes)

1. Make announcements, conduct a closing ceremony or give a brief Inspirational closing thought

LEADER RESPONSIBILITIES

To be shared with all new adults:

COMMITTEE CHAIRMAN

Conducts monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting to help plan program. Ensures that adequate support is given by committee members to support Cubmaster and Den Leaders. Helps recruit additional leaders as needed. Views Fast Start video with Viewer's Guide and then attends training.

COMMITTEE MEMBERS

Attend monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting to help plan program and take care of records, finances, advancement, activities, membership, etc. Views Fast Start video with Viewer's Guide and then attends training.

CUBMASTER

Conducts monthly pack meeting. Aids den leaders by coordinating monthly program for all leaders. Attends monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting. Views Fast Start video with Viewer's Guide and then attends training. Should have one or more assistants.

DEN LEADER

Meets weekly for about one hour with den of six to eight boys. Den meeting is held in den leader's home, church, or other suitable place. Den leader determines time, day, and location of den meeting that is most convenient for him/her. Attends monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting. Views Fast Start video with Viewer's Guide and then attends training. Has one or more assistants and parent helpers.

WEBELOS DEN LEADER

Same as den leader except works with older Webelos Scouts and encourages periodic parent/son overnight campouts. Attends monthly Pack Leaders' Meeting. Views Fast Start video with Viewer's Guide and then attends training. Should have one or more assistants and parent helpers.

PARENT HELPERS (Should be registered as Assistant Den Leaders or Committee Members)

Assist pack and/or den with specific projects as needed by the leaders. All parents help their sons with advancement. Review *Cub Scout Achievement Trail for Advancement for Parents* and individual boy books - *Wolf*, *Bear*, and *Webelos*.
